Valley Park Community Association's Community Kettle

A community group in Valley Park, which was sparked into life by a small Cost of Living grant, has gone from strength to strength and now has an average of 40 residents attending each week.

This event started as a warm hub (after receiving a grant from TVBC which funded the initial start up costs) however the trustees quickly realised that it was loneliness that they should be combatting rather than the cost of living. They rebranded as the 'Community Kettle' and started to provide a space for anyone to attend on Tuesdays between 12-2pm, originally providing teas and cakes. However, this quickly progressed to include monthly talks from experts that have covered topics from home and cyber security to maintaining the local woodlands. Using their monthly magazine, posters, website updates, Facebook and word of mouth they have managed to build on the number of attendees steadily, and



it now covers its own costs.

From this event the association have seen an increase in the number of people volunteering for other events. As well as accounts from many of the attendees who described the event as the "highlight of their week",

resulting in the reduction of loneliness.

The Community Kettle was initiated by the Community Association, who themselves benefited from a Councillor Community Grant from Councillors Celia and Alan Dowden in September 2023.

Cllrs Alan and Celia Dowden said. "Communities need and benefit from a central organisation. The Valley Park Community Association provides a range of valuable information, through The Voice newsletter. It organises speakers and events for residents to enjoy. As local Councillors we have taken part in these events and regularly supported the Valley Park Association with grant funding to enable this valuable resource to continue its role within our community."

New Changing Places facility opens on Andover High Street

Test Valley Borough Council's new Changing Places toilet (CPT) in Andover High Street is now open.

Located on 71 High Street in Andover, adjacent to the British Heart Foundation shop and the Blue Onion Café, the CPT provides fully accessible toilets that include a height adjustable changing bench, a hoisting system, and a toilet with enough space on both sides to allow wheelchair transfers or assistance from carers.

To individuals with more complex disabilities these toilets can be life-changing, enabling them and their carers can get out and about in the confidence that suitable toilet facilities exist nearby.

The new facility joins three existing CPTs in Andover, including one at the Unity offices by the bus station, one at Purple Oak in the Wellington Centre and another at Andover Leisure Centre.

As well as the new CPT being in a central location, it is also open late into the evening. You can only access it using a RADAR key. If you're disabled and want to apply for a RADAR key, you can visit the TVBC offices, or apply online at www.testvalley.gov.uk/radarkeys

The facility was funded by a government grant, and Muscular Dystrophy UK provided advice and technical help.

Local ward councillors, Cllr Jan Budzynski, Cllr Iris Andersen and Cllr Debbie Cattell, cut the ribbon to open the new facility on Friday 19 July.

Leader of the council, Councillor Phil North, said: "We know from speaking with residents and carers who use Changing Places toilets, what a huge difference they make to those with complex disabilities. And it is fantastic that Andover now has four of these facilities. I am grateful to everyone involved in the project for all their hard work and support."

Lee Roberts, business support manager from Purple Oak Support who attended the opening, added: "Having a changing places toilet in the centre of town will make such a difference to people with disabilities and incontinence support needs. It will ensure disabled people can enjoy what the town has to offer late into the evenings, knowing there are toilet facilities available to meet their needs. We know this will have such a

When considering locating the new CPT in the High Street, engagement with local groups, including the Enablement Network, received really positive feedback. Comments included the opportunity to increase footfall to town centre events and positive benefits to the disabled community.

There are various public toilet facilities in the town centre, including in the Chantry Centre opposite Boswells and by the bus station. There are also several businesses signed up to the council's Community Toilet Scheme, which means you can use their facilities without having to make a purchase. These include Grilled Cheese Café, Café Bridge, Costa Coffee and White Hart pub.

Bell ringers appeal answered by council funds



Local councillors have awarded £1,000 to the bell ringers of St Peter's Church in East Tytherley to refurbish the lighting in their ringing room and belfry.

The bell ringers of St Peter's Church in East Tytherley have been awarded £1000 from the Test Valley Council Councillor Community Grants fund to refurbish the lighting in their ringing room and belfry.

The building, known locally as 'the church in the field' due to its rural location, is a listed building and the main space and ringing room are the only community spaces in East Tytherley, which no longer has a village hall. The current lighting is very old with an emergency light that takes a few seconds to come on in the event of a power cut... not unknown in this remote location!

Work started earlier in Spring, when the Lockerley and East Tytherley ringers met with Mid-test Councillor Stewart MacDonald to check on progress. (pictured)

Jen Churchill, one of the bellringers group, said: "The lighting improvement in the tower will bring a far more pleasant experience for people using it for meetings and gatherings.

"The steeple keepers are also very pleased that they will soon be able to climb around the belfry with adequate lighting when servicing the bells. We would all like to express our thanks and gratitude to the council for their generosity."

Cllr MacDonald said: "I am delighted to support this important initiative in East Tytherley. With no other community buildings in the parish, St Peter's is at the heart of the East Tytherley community.

"This is yet another example of how the Test Valley Community Councillor grant scheme can make a real difference at a very local level. We have recently supported initiatives across Mid

Romsey Abbey Wildflower Meadow



Councillor Community Grants are awarded across the Test Valley region and could benefit your local group, club or organisation.

Back in May the Countryside Team along with Environmental Services began the process of transforming the North Church Yard at Romsey Abbey into a vibrant wildflower meadow.

After several years as part of the Urban Meadows project the meadow at the North Church Yard failed to improve in diversity on its own.

The team laid a product known as Meadowscape Pro on top of the existing meadow area. The product is made up of mulch mixed with wildflower seed, giving the seed the best start to begin to grow. Three months on and the Church yard has become a colour rich, diverse wildflower meadow, buzzing with life.

At the end of the summer the meadow will be cut and collected to allow for fresh growth the following year. At this time any areas that have not established will be reseeded with a complimentary mix to ensure success the following season.

Community grant awarded to Andover Bowling Club

Our recent community grant, awarded to Andover Bowling Club, made the local ITV News recently.

It's a great example of how our place-based approach is working to deliver real

improvements for people in our communities.

A veteran bowls player from Hampshire says he's been given a new lease of life because of a specialist wheelchair.

Jack Norris, 89, has been a member at [Andover Bowling Club](#) since 2016, having previously played in Canada and the United States. He was considering giving up his life-long hobby due to his limited mobility, until the new equipment changed his game completely.

The specialist wheelchair has been paid for by a community grant from Test Valley Borough Council and a local organisation called The Sofa Club.



The arm rests on the specialist wheelchair rotate to give the user the ability to bowl the ball.

Jack said: "I wasn't going to bowl at all this year, because of my stability of being on the mat and I thought I was going to fall, and I didn't think it was fair to the other team members, but I was told they had this

wheelchair and I'll tell you, this wheelchair has been a lifeline for me, and I don't know how long I've got to live, but it's given me more years of good bowling. There are arms, which rotate round, so you've got one side that's free, so whoever is using it can swing their arm and deliver the bowl without any encumbrance on their movement.'

"It means they can play regularly, and then they don't feel as though they can only play half a game. They can actually play sitting down and play the whole game.

Cllr Iris Andersen, Test Valley Borough Council, said: "This is an essential grant to help communities. It's absolutely wonderful to see the impact that the person can be in that wheelchair, can use it."

Water safety devices upgraded after spate of vandalism



We've rolled out new water safety devices at Anton Lakes. Test Valley Borough Council is set to upgrade water safety devices across its sites following a rise in vandalism and misuse of life rings.

Officers currently waste the equivalent of four days a month being called out to collect life rings that have been thrown into ponds and lakes at the

council's nature reserves and parks.

And, critically, with missing safety equipment posing a risk to life, the authority has taken advice from Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire and Rescue Service and will be rolling out new Throw Line Housing Stations across the borough, beginning with a pilot at Anton Lakes.

Each station contains a throw line, which users can access in an emergency by dialling 999 and providing the precise location reference displayed on the unit. The call handler will give them a code to unlock the throw line, which can be used repeatedly.

Rikki Noble, Test Valley Station Manager at Hampshire and Isle of Wight Fire and Rescue said: " If someone is in trouble in the water, the best way to help is by staying calm, staying on land, and remembering Call, Tell, Throw: call 999 for the emergency services, tell the struggling person to float on their back, throw them something that floats.

"These new water safety stations will help people by providing vital lifesaving equipment and giving them clear instructions so they understand what to do in an emergency. They will also help us to easily identify the location and reach anyone in need as quickly as possible.

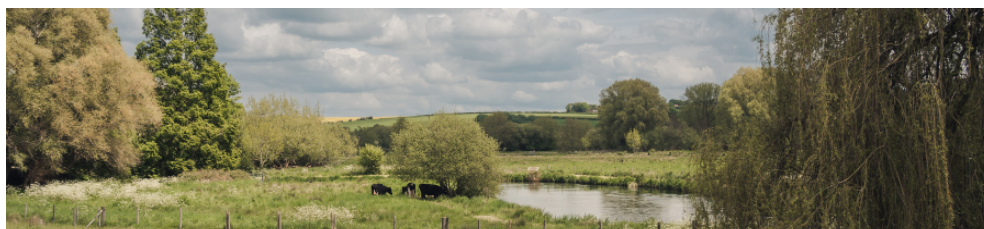
Cllr Terese Swain, Portfolio Holder for Community, Leisure and Tourism, said:

"Lakes on Test Valley Borough Council land aren't for swimming or paddling, but accidents happen, and these safety devices are there for anyone needing urgent, lifesaving help.

"In 2022, 266 people drowned accidentally in the UK and more of these drowning incidents took place in inland waterways than the sea

Funding available for rural businesses



Do you run a rural business in Test Valley or know someone who does? If so, the government is offering grants of £5k to £25k for up to 50 per cent of the capital project costs for small and medium sized rural businesses, so please get in touch with us if you have a project you're looking to fund.

Typically, the grants can fund equipment, machinery and building work with planning permission already in place. Projects must be completed by the end of March 2025, with all invoices submitted before this date.

The latest funded projects include:

A small-scale investment at a farm looking to diversify income streams. The grant will cover the conversion of an old agriculture barn into commercial office space.

Support for a gin distillery to diversify by creating a new spiced rum.

Please apply as soon as possible - grants will be assessed on a monthly basis until the funding pot is exhausted.

Animal foster crisis - can you help?

Rescue centres nationally are in crisis with far more dogs needing homes than can be housed. This is why rescue centres are looking for fosterers to look after dogs until they can find a new home.

Last week, our Animal Welfare Officer, Rod Mason, had three Huskies, two French Bulldogs and 29 assorted breeds, along with a couple of tiny kittens that needed help.

Dogs Trust had just over 600 pleas for help for the first six months of 2023. This year that number has doubled to over 1,200.

The lockdown dogs, cost of living and skyrocketing vet bills are culminating in the perfect storm for unwanted dogs.

If you think you may be able to foster a dog until it finds a home do get in touch with one of the local charities. They desperately need your help!

The main charities locally are: Dogs Trust Salisbury, Hungerford National Animal Welfare Trust. Dogs Trust Newbury. Blue Cross Southampton.
